### Magician's rabbit disappeared; irate wife served it to him!

A friend of Ring member Mary Ann Campbell, knowing of her interest in magic, sent her the following article recently:

RYDE, England -- A magician's wife, irritated at his frequent absences abroad, pulled the rabbit he usually pulled from his hat from her stove.

Chris Cox said Friday that his 29-year-old wife and former assistant, Christine, killed Roger the rabbit and served him for dinner at their home in Ryde, southern England.

The Times newspaper reported that Chris Cox said she killed the rabbit accidentally when she kicked over a pile of her husband's stage props in a fit of rage at his absence.

An accomplished cook, she skinned and cooked the rabbit in a marinade of prunes, stewed tea, bacon drippings and red wine.

"Christine's a good cook and is always making unusual dishes," Cox was quoted as saying in the Times. "She asked me to guess what it was, and I said I thought it might be chicken. Eventually she told me, and I just couldn't finish it. I nearly threw up. It's causing a fair amount of tension between us," Cox, 48, said.

Yes, it was a business trip -- to the National Newspaper Association annual Fall Convention & Trade Show in Cincinnati, September 15-18. But for a friend of mine -- professional magician Jania Taylor of Fort Wayne, Indiana -- and me, it also was a magical two days.

Here is a report on the first day. I'll continue next month with a report of our visit to a private magic museum the second day, and will bring photos to show and tell at the November meeting.

Jania (pronounced Jane-ya) needed some new silks and wanted to visit <u>Bill Brewe's Magic Shop</u> since he specializes in them. He has an interesting store in an old residential section, east of downtown. My first thought when we walked in was "What a great selection of magic books (I bought two)." I resisted buying more although I wanted to.

On display above the several shelves of books, and across the room were thousands of tricks and props, all for the serious magician. This was not a joke, novelty and costume shop, like many modern magic stores. The shop even has a stage (where the local SAM chapter meets).

Bill believes in quality silks and -becoming dissastified with his supplier -began making his own. He buys bolts of quality material and is particular about the handiwork, too. I bought a pink one for my "Rose-into-silk" effect.

#### Where decks are made

Then we drove across town to the famous <u>Haines House of Cards</u>. A retail magic store -- with over a dozen display cases -- occupies

the front room as you enter. An island of display cases greets visitors. One entire wall is devoted to magic books, pamphlets and lecture notes. It's a fine magic store, and worth a visit.

But the highlight -- and our main reason for the effort to find the store at a busy intersection just north of downtown -- was to see where all those "Haines decks" we all have in our collections, are made.

When it became obvious that we were serious magicians, we were offered a tour of the back rooms, where the decks of cards are produced. It was fascinating to see the process of preparing and assembling the thousands of decks of cards which are shipped all over the world.

There were hand-made racks and forms where normal decks are disassembled and then prepared with all those secrets which make them work, and reassembled and packaged. Currently the magic craze in Japan is straining the small, all-woman crew to keep up with the demand.

Bill Brewe told us an eerie story when he heard we were going to the Haines shop. He said many years ago, the store had to move from the original location for more room. Still later—under new owners—they outgrew the second location and looked around for still another one.

Finding an old cinder block building, they decided they could expand and remodel it and make it work. Having completed the deal, the woman owner asked the Haines people what they were going to use the building for. They said a magic store. "Oh, came the reply, "my father used to own a magic store." Come to find out, he was the original owner and that was the original site of Haines magic company.

Talk about spooky and fate.

### Mary Ann Campbell graces cover of new women's publication
