

Member of the month: Magic Musings newsletter editor Dennis Schick

Dennis Schick is this month's member in the spotlight. As you know, he is the founder and editor of this newsletter. He started it in April 1993 and hasn't missed an issue since.

Dennis has been Executive Director of the <u>Arkansas Press Association</u> (APA) since May 1979. This is his 20th year with that organization.

APA is the oldest <u>trade association</u> in the state, having been founded in 1873. In fact, 1998 is the 125th Anniversary of APA. They are celebrating all year.

APA is a voluntary organization whose members are the 104 weekly and 33 daily newspapers in the state. The association does all the typical things associations do. They conduct two major conventions a year. In fact, they just finished their Summer Convention, in Eureka Springs, at which there were three major debates. You may have read about them in the newspaper.

In addition, they conduct a dozen or more seminars each year, on everything from newswriting and selling advertising to editorial writing and photography. They conduct two major contests among their members (news-editorial and advertising); lobby the state government (on such issues as the Freedom of Information Act, which concerns open meetings and open records); and

work with newspapers to keep them out of trouble (with the IRS, USPS, etc.) and help them be more profitable.

The APA produces a weekly newsletter, a quarterly magazine and an annual Directory.

In addition to APA. Dennis supervises two other corporations: Arkansas Press Services (APS) and the Arkansas Newspaper Foundation (ANF). APS is the for-profit sister to APA. It has a mailing service (news releases, press kits, photos, etc.); an advertising service (it places advertising in newspapers for ad agencies and advertisers); and a statewide classified advertising service.

The Foundation raises funds for journalism education projects, from scholarships and internships, to literacy, Kids Voting and Newspapers in Education (NIE).

APA is located at the corner of Broadway and 17th, a block from the Governor's Mansion. APA, APS and ANF have a staff of nine full-time and one part-timer.

Was a teacher

Before joining APA, Dennis taught at several universities for 15 years: the University of Texas, Oklahoma State University, Southern Illinois University and Texas Christian University. He taught journalism, public relations and advertising. He continues to teach part-time at UALR at night (adver-

tising in the School of Business).

He has a B.S. in Journalism and English from TCU; a M.S. in advertising and marketing from the University of Illinois; and a Ph.D. in mass communication and marketing from Southern Illinois University.

Getting started in magic

Like a lot of magicians, Dennis received a magic kit as a boy and played around with it for several years. But other interests took over and it wasn't until about 15 years ago when he was at a meeting in New Orleans that he rediscovered magic. He walked by a Magic Masters store, stopped and -- an hour later -- went away with \$75 worth of magic. He's been back at it ever since. He has quite an extensive magic book collection and has a special interest in the business of magic.

A native of Michigan, he was reared in the Midwest, graduating from high school in upstate New York (Cortland). He came to the Southwest in the Army in 1957 (with Elvis) and has been here ever since.

Dennis and his wife of 38 years -- Jan -- live in North little Rock. They have three grown children: <u>Leslie</u>, a communications specialist at ALLTEL; <u>Gregory</u>, a master control operator at Channel 7 and parttime youth director at his church; and <u>Tim</u>, a producer at Jones Productions.

Melinda: The First Lady of Magic

BRANSON, MO. Melinda: First Lady of Magic, the world's most renowned female magician, will present her spectacular stage show at Melinda's Magical Mansion, one of Branson's premier theaters, beginning April 15, 1998. The 3,000-seat Magical Mansion was constructed in 1993 at a cost of over \$17 million dollars.

Melinda is the first and only female magician ever to have her own primetime television special. It appeared on CBS on May 30, 1997, entitled "Disney's Melinda, First Lady of Magic." The show received rave reviews such as these:

In Melinda's live stage show in Branson, she will perform her most popular original illusions from her TV show and international tour, including the Winged Horse Vanish, where Melinda causes her winged dancing horse to instantly disappear. The Jet Appearance, in which Melinda causes a piloted jet with whining engines to



appear on stage; and Speeding Car Vanish, where a sports car vanishes at 100 miles per hour, live on stage. And in what is possibly the most terrifying illusion in magic today, Melinda will perform Drill, The Ultimate Nightmare, where she faces a giant industrial drill aimed right at her torso. Will she survive?

The show's finale features Melinda's trademark illusion entitled Fireflies: The Experience a heartfelt tribute to grandparents.

Melinda is also an accomplished dancer. She will be joined on stage by a large cast of dancers and magical assistants. Melinda's magic is underscored by a variety of styles of music including popular country, pop, rock and jazz songs.

Melinda's show will also include a number of variety acts never before seen in Branson.

Among Melinda's many TV credits are appearances on *The Tonight Show* with Jay Leno, *The Oprah Winfrey Show, The Today Show,* and *Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous,* as well as featured appearances on NBC's *World's Greatest Magic I & II* and many others.

In addition, Melinda was ranked by *USA Today* as one of the Top Three Magicians in the World. Accompanying her on the list were David Copperfield and Siegfried and Roy.
